At PCMN, we conducted several key events, foremost of which are the 21st General Assembly, and a webinar on Growing Local Giving for Sustainable Fundraising partnership with Christian Stewardship Association. After the General Assembly, the BOT met and elected their officers. This year, we have the following officers of the Board of Trustees: Fr. Lendehl Sallidao of Jigsaw Kids Ministry as Chairperson, Rommel Fuerte of WV as Vice-Chairperson, Norman Agustin of Lingap Pangkabataan, Inc. as Corporate Secretary, Sol Balbero of Kanlungan sa Erma as Treasurer. Other members of the Board are Leah Genson of MCMN, Ptr. Jackson Natividad of Gintong Aral, Annalyn Alenton of Samaritan's Purse, Ptra. Ana Sasi of ESCRAN, and Bishop Noel Pantoja, occupying the permanent seat as National Director of PCEC.

For the period, PCMN met each of its regional networks to provide technical support on network governance and activities for the year. We likewise started to respond to children affected by typhoon Ulysses in 3 municipalities of Rizal, namely, Rodriguez, San Mateo, and Tanay through the Rizal Children's Ministries Network and the ministerial associations

of the municipalities. A similar project will commence in April to assist children affected by typhoon Goni in Virac and Bato in the province of Catanduanes in partnership with Gintong Aral Development, Inc. and local churches in the areas with support from Viva and Global Care.

For the next quarter, significant events are the conduct of the National Youth Summit (Assembly) on April 10, and part 2 of the webinar on Growing Local Giving on April 23. We likewise continue to implement End OSEC with IJM and Viva Denmark consortium and Let's Eliminate Online Sexual Abuse and Exploitation project in partnership with the LGUs and various stakeholders in the cities of Dasmarinas, Iligan, and Antipolo.

The first quarter is almost gone, this is the time in our life history when it is imperative to stay healthy and whole. Cheers, be well everyone! We keep the faith, our sovereign God is not sleeping, He is with us in this journey.#

PCMN, in collaboration with CSA, hosts its first-ever paid webinar on local giving

"Fundraising is a journey. We take our donors on a journey to discover the freedom and joy of giving." Christian Stewardship Association (CSA) Ambassador, Mr. Efren Pallorina said as he concluded the webinar on Growing Local Giving for Sustainable Fundraising held last February 5, 2021, via Zoom.

A total of 91 participants from the Philippine Children's Ministries Network (PCMN) members and partners, CSA contacts, and external partners registered to join the webinar.

"To raise fundraisers at this unprecedented time is a step of faith and a hard task." PCMN National Director, Ms. Fe A. Foronda, said as she gave the welcome remarks and stated the objectives on why PCMN, in partnership with CSA, hosted a webinar on fundraising. The webinar aimed to inform and inspire the PCMN member organizations that raising indigenous support ensures the long-term sustainability of ministries.

Mr. Pallorina, the webinar's moderator, gave biblical-theological teaching and examples from the Bible. He quotes Proverbs 11:25 "whoever brings blessings will be enriched, and the one who waters will himself be watered." He emphasized that the generosity of the believers came out of the fulness of the Holy Spirit in them (Acts 2:44-45). He said that through fundraising, we build a community and a communion of giving and receiving.

The webinar showcased stories of local fundraising. CSA president and former Asian Theological Seminary development director, Zenet Maramara, shared how ATS transitioned from foreign funding to local support. David "Dabs" Liban, debunked fundraising myths when World Vision began local fundraising. Visions of Hope executive director, and founder of Right Start, Arlene Sy showed how they raise all-local support through various fundraising campaigns. A ministry supporter, Carol V. Roa, gave her testimonial as a local donor.

Ms. Maramara's talk focused on her stewardship journey and setting up the local fundraising department. She showed four keys to the success of local giving, i.e. a clear theology of fundraising, full-time fundraising, support from the board and leadership, and setting up an annual giving program. She recommends that the fundraising person forms a fundraising committee of four to six people to help with the planning and execution of the development plan.

"We are raising stewards, not raising funds." – the line that captured the advocacy of Mr. Liban as he discussed the myths of fundraising and tips on effective fundraising such as using bite–size stories and development nuggets and guiding people every step until they discover the heart of Jesus in the face of children we are helping.

"Find your niche", stresses Arlene Sy, as she shared the steps and strategies in building a startup fundraising program. She shared the steps she used in an NGO, Right Start, which she builds it from zero to a four million annual budget. "Funders look for impact rather than the activities.", she added.

After the fundraiser's perspectives, Ms. Roa shared her testimony as a local giver. As she provided the seven principles to be considered between organizations and funders and noted that it was never a transactional but a transformational relationship. She adds, "prayer is the greatest asset, discernment is second." Giving is a way of life for generous people! That is our goal to grow generous people. That is why we need to give people giving opportunities." Ms. Maramara said as she synthesized the takeaways of the webinar.

PCMN collaborated with CSA as PCMN wishes to build the capacity of its member organizations and partners to resource locally more effectively.#

PCMN kicks off the first out of ten training in partnership with IJM: Trauma-Informed Care

PCMN, through its End Online Sexual Exploitation of Children (End OSEC) project, conducted its first out of ten training in partnership with the International Justice Mission (IJM) Philippines. Last March 2 to 4, the End OSEC Dasmarinas City Team conducted the Trauma-Informed Care training with 32 participants via Zoom and 30 participants at Jabez Campsite located in the City of Dasmariñas.

Participants are from different representatives from church-based organizations, academe, local government units, and social workers from various shelters, to name a few.

Together with the E-OSEC Dasmariñas team were six (6) resource speakers with a great understanding of the Trauma-Informed Care Training modules. The speakers from IJM, namely Ms. Melanie Olano, Ms. Marie Joy Abasa, Ms. Jessa Lazarte, Ms. Mary Joy Bilason, Ms. Ma. Karen April Asuncion and Ms. Teresita Parana have shared their expertise in their field as social workers and demonstrated proper techniques on handling and addressing challenging behaviors caused by trauma using trauma-informed approaches.



Staff members learned from the expertise of Ms. Gayares as she shared the 3 C's in teamwork and the different challenges virtual teams commonly face, especially during this time of dealing with a "new normal" work setup.

At the heart of PCMN's #End OSEC policy advocacy

At the heart of PCMN's #End OSEC policy advocacy are two goals:

- 1) To advocate for the review and amendment of existing OSEC-related laws and
- 2) to advocate for the enactment of HB1556 "An Act Establishing a Human Trafficking Prevention Education Program for the Youth, and Appropriating Funds Therefor."

With the first one, we are calling on decision-makers to support a specific policy issue and, in the second, PCMN, together with Child Rights Network, are lobbying behind a particular bill.



AN ACT

Policy Change Corner

Through PCMN partners' advocacy actions, such as the published OSEC Report of the International Justice Mission (IJM) and the matrix of laws of the Child Rights Network (CRN), lawmakers in the House Representatives and the Senate see the need to take action. Aside from the resolutions that call for "An investigation, in aid of legislation, on the alarming situation of OSEC in the Philippines," several bills have been filed this past year to strengthen the existing laws on child protection. The laws are the Anti-Trafficking in Persons Act, the Anti-Child Pornography Act, and the Anti-Photo and Video Voyeurism Act.



AN ACT
STRENGTHENING REPUBLIC ACT NO. 9208, AS AMENDED BY REPUBLIC ACT

PROTECTION AND SUPPORT OF TRAFFICKED PERSONS, PROVIDING


EXPLANATORY NOTE

Trafficking in persons remains a significant issue in the Philippines, with a vast majority of victims being women and girls. In 2019, there were 1,443 victims of trafficking in case officially reported to the authorities. Studies conducted reveal patterns in these cases of trafficking — nearly all victims of trafficking come from economically-disadvantaged communities, the trafficking syndicates are supported by other interlinked syndicates such as those involved in passport falsification and airport control, the internet and its technologies are now used as a gateway for the recruitment, grooming, and sexual exploitation of victims.

Though these and other laws are already in place, they do not include or define the term OSEC or consider the distinct nature of this crime. That is why it is important to make changes to protect children in all aspects—prevention, rescue, and restoration—and aid in the investigation and prosecution of offenders and facilitators.

PCMN has joined forces with our partners and other stakeholders—both nationally and locally to push for this. The fight against OSEC requires a multi-sectoral and holistic approach. Representatives from the private sector, civil society, and government have come together for the recent deliberations and hearings at the House of Representatives and the Senate.

Through these ongoing consultations, lawmakers are able to identify the gaps in the existing laws and draft the amendments that will best address OSEC or OSAEC, which includes "abuse" or sexual violence against a child, with or without compensation.



Some provisions that are being discussed are:

- The duties and obligations of private entities, such as Internet service providers (ISPs), internet content hosts or websites, social media companies, business establishments, and banking and financial institutions.
- The provision of exceptions in the Anti-Wiretapping Act and Cybercrime Prevention Act.
- Measures to strengthen government authorities' powers to implement laws and ensure that crimes are investigated and perpetrators are punished.

Policy Change <u>Corner</u>

- The development of a unified referral pathway for reporting, detecting, investigating, prosecuting, and providing aftercare assistance and support in OSAEC cases.
- · The provision for local governments to pass an ordinance to localize efforts against OSAEC, take into account local culture and norms, institutionalize community-based initiatives that address OSAEC at the barangay and level, and establish OSAEC prevention programs.
- · Mandatory services and programs for the rehabilitation and reintegration of victims of OSAEC. Appropriate measures to prevent, protect, and rehabilitate children.



Among the proposed preventive measures is institutionalizing a "Human Trafficking Prevention Education Program" to protect children and youth against the dangers of human trafficking in its various forms through HB 1556.

The development of these school and community-based programs aim to:

- 1) Educate children and youth about fundamental rights concerning labor and employment, liberty, and human security, as well as other essential rights;
- 2) Orient children and youth about the dangers of international and domestic trafficking in its various forms, including but not limited to illegal recruitment, unfair labor practices, involuntary servitude, sexual exploitation and prostitution, and child labor;
- 3) Provide children and youth with information on services provided by the government agencies and non-governmental organizations to aid and protect victims of trafficking in persons;
- 4) Identify children and youth who have been or are currently victims of human trafficking and refer them to the proper agency or organization for protection and rehabilitation; and

This fifth objective is an added point in Senate bill 1929, which amends the Anti-Trafficking in Persons Act and also includes the provision for preventive education:

5) Establish a safe and proactive trafficking reporting mechanism that allows members of the school community to report suspected or confirmed cases of human trafficking within the school, the school-based program shall cover all students enrolled in junior high schools, senior high schools, colleges and universities, and technical or vocational education programs.





Policy Change Corner

PCMN proposed the inclusion has elementary-level children as recipients of the While human trafficking many schemes target the youth, OSEC, as the name implies, targets children. What is more, according to the IJM report, young children are the most vulnerable, with the median age of victims being 11 years old. Our recommendation is in line with the design of our OSEC education modules, which were rolled out to students as young as grade 3.

In addition to the national legislative actions, PCMN sees the value of advocating for policy change at the local level through ordinances that will strengthen the fight against OSEC in the communities where it matters most. Our advocacy workshops in the cities of Dasmariñas, Iligan, and Antipolo focus on policy development by equipping the city advocates with skills and tools to draft an ordinance that is effective and responsive against OSEC.

It is our shared responsibility to work together. We all can engage in advocacy and influence legislators. We all can change attitudes and create awareness wherever we are. Together, we can work toward stronger mechanisms to protect and empower our children. In one of our workshops, Kuya Rene quoted the American anthropologist Margaret Mead. I would like to aptly end with her words, which ring true in policy change:

"Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the only thing that ever has."#

PCMN reaches out to vulnerable families in times of pandemic: A project with Consuelo Foundation

In February of 2021, PCMN has signed the Project Partnership Agreement (PPA) with Consuelo Foundation on Child and Family Phone Mentoring Programme (CFPM). The program calls for recruitment of mentors to implement the curriculum. PCMN partnered with the Mindanao Children's Ministries Network (MCMN) and existing community actors and churches in Davao City to implement the program, in coordination with the Davao City Local Council for the Protection of Children and the City Social Welfare and Development Office.

Partnership Corner

The goal of the CFPM program is to reduce violence against children. This program will enable PCMN-MCMN to access the most vulnerable families who will otherwise be unreached, particularly those with a lack of internet access and economic vulnerability.

CFPM action group identified 10 barangays coming from the congressional districts 1, 2, and 3. Each barangay is represented by its Violence Against Women and Children (VAWC) to work with MCMN member staff as its partner who will serve as mentors to reach out to 400 families within four (4) months. These 20 mentors will talk with an average of 20 families each through a focused conversation with one parent and one child in the family through six sessions delivered by phone call, online or in-person where this becomes possible. These sessions are participatory and engaging and support proactive action for the family on each topic. Games or activities for the parent and child to do together following the call are part of the sessions.

The project engages 20 barangays in Davao City, partnership is signed with barangay LGUs. The training on CFPM and the monitoring tool, KOBO, was conducted last February 24, 2021.


20 mentors enlisted 200 vulnerable families to undergo the CFPM in its first cycle.

CFPM Programme was successfully launched last March 9, 2021, through 1197 DXFE on-air and FB live coverage represented by the MCMN BOT Chairperson Aurelia Gabao, LCPC Action Officer, and CSWDO Dept. Head, Atty. Marlisa Gallo and USEP Extension Head, Lindy Lulab with Leah Genson and Daisy Fuentes as co-hosts.

The first week of implementation was very challenging considering the COVID-19 protocols. A group chat for mentors was created for closer communication among each other. A Buddy system was created as an accountability mechanism.

In the first call, some mentors discovered some child protection concerns of families they called. The issues besetting the families were thoroughly discussed and recommendations were forwarded per each resolution. #

Partnership Corner

Church-community engagement, a resilience-building model

In partnership with Rizal Children's Ministries Network and Gintong Aral Development, Inc. as the lead agency, PCMN is implementing a Community-Based Psychological First Aid program for one thousand (1,000) children between the ages of 6 and 14 years in three of the worst-hit municipalities in Rizal. The project will run for six (6) months and serve as an opportunity for PCMN to mobilize local churches and explore the viability of a broader and more sustainable response to the province's child protection needs.

PCMN launched this project in Tanay, San Mateo, and Rodriguez as a post-disaster response to Typhoon Ulysses that hit these municipalities last November 2020.

Operation SAFE camps have been conducted firstly in Tanay. Operation SAFE teaches children five important principles to psychological first-aid.



With stories, crafts, songs, and games, children learn at their level, make friends, share their experiences, and regain hope. Children first step to healing are through these activities designed to be friendly and engaging. Easily run by volunteers and coordinated by locals, Operation SAFE frees up professional counselors to work with the most severe trauma cases and helps identify which children need the most help.

Another important component of the project is engaging churches through the Hope Bearer, a curriculum that offers 30 lessons to help kids live confidently in the face of uncertainty. It is designed to help organizations focusing on children's work function in the new normal. If adults are having difficulty coping with the pandemic crisis and its effects, how must children feel? They, too, need to be reassured that in the midst of what seems to be chaos, there is hope. Like grown-ups, children need to understand that there are things that never change, such as love from parents and duty bearers. It maximizes the scripture on its Psychosocial Support lessons and Psychological First Aid for children.

The modality by which OpSafe and Hope Bearer is conducted is through active engagements with local actors such as volunteers from churches and barangays.#

WHI invited PCMN to conduct the Safety of Children Online Training of Trainers to their advocates from Churches and Salvation Army in Regions 6,7,8 and selected participants from Cagayan de Oro and General Santos City in line with their "Protecting At-Risk Children Vulnerable to Exploitation (PAVE 2) project". A total of 42 individuals participated from the said regions and cities.

The PAVE project of WHI aims to develop and strengthen systems for comprehensive care of survivors of OSEC in the Philippines.

The project supports social workers and other stakeholders in identifying OSEC survivors, strengthening comprehensive service delivery for OSEC survivors, and increasing muchneeded shelter provisions.

It is also working with churches and training leaders to identify OSEC survivors in need of care and prevent exploitation within their churches.

With the current End OSEC Project, more local and international NGOs have gained trust in PCMN's Prevention Campaign Materials. With efforts continuous in empowering community to fight OSEC, WHI sees this as an opportunity to empower the communities they are working with the lessons from PCMN's Safety of Children Online Module with nine topics. The module has topics on the following: I am important; I have rights; OSEC Definition; Situation and Incidence; How does it happen?, What are its forms?; Who are vulnerable to OSEC?; My Role: What can I do to prevent OSEC?; People I trust, and How do I Report OSEC?.



"Sobrang galing! Very active ang pax dahil sa activities ninyo! Good job sainyo! Ang galing!" (Excellent! The participants are very active because of your activities! Good job to you!), words of amusement from Mr. Fredirico of WHI who organized the event.

The trained advocates are expected to conduct the said module's roll-outs to their respective regions and cities. With the trust WHI gave PCMN's prevention materials, more communities will be informed and equipped to fight OSEC.#


60 Teachers Trained for Hope Bearer in CSMPCMN Webinar

of the network coordinators in Mindanao, Eastern Samar, Northern Samar, Negros, and Iligan City about the ministry of churches standing together to address the needs of children, youth and families in their locales.

The keynote address, entitled, "Understanding God's Heart for Children" was presented by Leah Yebes Genson, the Network Coordinator responsible for overseeing the regional networks in Mindanao and Visayas.

In the afternoon, a similar conference took place in San Mateo. Twenty-four churches located in that municipality were represented by 78 leaders heard from the regional network coordinators as well as from Operation Mobilization, a member agency of RCMN. The keynote address, entitled, Six Truths the Bible is Saying About Children, was delivered by Vilma Awa-ao, a former volunteer of PCMN, now serving as a missionary in Taiwan.

Following each keynote address and an orientation to the components of the six-month project, a workshop was conducted as a preliminary strategizing and visioning session concerning how their respective congregations could engage with the projects and come together long-term as a network.

The catalyst project for the launching of the San Mateo and Montalban branches of RCMN comes on the heels of the damage wrought in the region by Typhoon Ulysses (November 2020). Key deliverables of the project include Mental Health provision of Psychosocial Support Services (MHPSS) to 1,000 children, and the mentoring of 500 families through a Family Telephone Mentoring project. The project manager is Mr. Ronilo Oyanib of PCMN, and the lead implementing Gintong Aral Community agency is Development Foundation, a member agency of

As central to PCMN's operational strategy is the convening, equipping, and support of local churches throughout the Philippines to stand together for children, youth, and families within their respective locales, RCMN is working hand in hand with the local churches to develop a sustainable network in each municipality. It is envisioned that by the close of the project in July 2021, these two municipal networks will be well on their way to sustainability.#

Learning in the New Normal

"Let's Eliminate Online Sexual Abuse and Exploitation of Children in a New Normal"

During the pandemic, PCMN never stopped working in advocating the protection of children against online sexual exploitation of children. According to the Child Rights Network, the number of abused children risen by three hundred percent due to lockdowns, where children are not able to call for help.

LE-OSAEC Team held its first virtual meeting with the Department of Education attended by Mr. Albeno Laryosa del Monte Jr., Ms. Maan Aveno Barreto, Mr. Louie Baculo of youth formation, and Mr. Noel Concha Merino, to present the "Let's Eliminate Online Sexual Abuse and Exploitation of Children" project in Antipolo City.

Due to the pandemic, PCMN would not be able to do a rollout for the schools. With this, PCMN produced a worksheet that will be given to the students of three barangays in Antipolo City such as Barangay Cupang, Sta. Cruz and San Roque. This worksheet serves as a tool to spread awareness and advocacy of online abuse and exploitation of children. It also helps PCMN to identify if there is a possible abuse happening in the student.

Collaboration and Partnership

Last December 15, 2020, PCMN and the Department of Education in Antipolo City had a virtual signing of Memorandum of Agreement via Zoom signed by PCMN National Director, Fe A. Foronda and Mr. Christopher, Diaz, CESO VI, from School's Division Office of Antipolo City. This partnership allows PCMN to strengthen the advocacy in ending Online Sexual Abuse and Exploitation of Children.#
